<p>About the role</p>	<p>The AIHW Health Group develops and maintains national data to support monitoring and reporting on the health of Australians. This includes monitoring determinants of health, health status and diseases, and related quality of life. The group reports on the health of populations and chronic disease monitoring, including cardiovascular disease, diabetes, cancer, kidney disease, arthritis and respiratory conditions. It also reports on related health services such as cancer screening. It coordinates the Institutes international work for the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development and the World Health Organisation.</p> <p>The Health Group is interested in hosting an intern in the Population Health and Primary Care Unit. The project will be within our Chronic Conditions workplan, but the details of the project may not be clear until closer to the time.</p> <p>We are looking for a student with an interest in health, and preferably with some statistics in their course. A student studying Science (any in the college of science would be fine), but Medical Science or Psychology would probably fit best. Alternatively, it could be someone with Bachelor of stats or even economics from the College of Economics if they have an interest.</p>
<p>Who are AIHW?</p>	<p>The AIHW is an Australian Government agency that produces authoritative and interesting reports, and other information products, on key health and welfare issues in Australia. One of our primary roles is to collect, analyse and report information drawn from health services, community services and housing assistance services.</p> <p>Data are the core resource of the Institute. In doing our work we collaborate closely and have effective data partnerships with many experts from around Australia, including the Australian Bureau of Statistics, governments at all levels, universities, research centres, and non-government organisations.</p> <p>To find out more about AIHW, please visit: http://www.aihw.gov.au/</p>
<p>What you need to know about the AIHW internships</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ One semester long for up to 20 hours per week (minimum of 10 weeks). ✓ Students are paid a stipend of \$5,862.12 per Semester for a total of 200 hours (20 hours a week for 10 weeks). ✓ Available to undergraduate students in their 3rd or 4th year of study (Masters or PhD students with an understanding and previous experience in data analytics)

How to Apply	<p>To apply, send your application by the closing date to engage.cecs@anu.edu.au using the subject line, <i>AIHW Internships</i>:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Send a one page summary of why you would like the opportunity and what relevant skills and experience you think they can bring to the role (see <i>About the role</i>). ✓ Provide your CV and the contract details of two referees. ✓ Ensure your CV contains your individual email address and phone number for AIHW to contact you directly. ✓ Include the course name and code for which you have been approved to gain credit for, including some information about the assessment you need to undertake (if you are a CECS student or another student using an elective to undertake this Internship, you can enrol using COMP3820 for Bachelor degrees or COMP8755 for Masters degrees). ✓ Include information on whether you are an Australian citizen, Permanent Resident or on a Student Visa.
Confirm this information <i>before</i> you apply	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Each College at ANU provides different options for gaining course credit for internships. You are required to speak with your College and Student Services area to clarify any course credit and enrol in the appropriate course. ✓ If you're planning to do an internship, you should map your remaining degree requirements to ensure that doing an internship does not have the unintended consequence of extending your degree. ✓ Check with your College for any other requirements in relation to undertaking internships. Some Colleges require students to attend Internship Induction sessions. ✓ Understand Intellectual Property (IP) and work performed under this paid internship, will be owned by the client and (unless the data is freely available), cannot be used in a student thesis without prior permission or as per the Internship Agreement.
How do I know if I have been successful?	<p>AIHW will contact you directly whether you have been successful or not.</p> <p>AIHW may want to meet you face to face for a discussion or interview before selecting the successful student.</p>
What if I have been successful?	<p>If successful, you are required to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Complete the Internship agreement in liaison with their College and AIHW (obtain a copy from engage.cecs@anu.edu.au and complete with your College Internship Coordinator or Student Services). ✓ A copy of the executed agreement must be sent to the AIHW Relationship Manager (engage.cecs@anu.edu.au) to ensure the student is paid. CECS Human Resources (HR) will organise this directly with the student once an executed agreement has been received. ✓ Only you are responsible for enrolling in the correct course for the Semester you are undertaking the

<p>About the role</p>	<p>In the Indigenous and Children's Group (ICG) the intern will have the opportunity to work on Indigenous health and welfare information and statistics. There are four units within the ICG that focus on Indigenous statistics and information: Analyses and Reporting, Primary Care Reporting, Modelling and Research, Spatial Analysis and Health Services.</p> <p>The Group works with several data collections including service level primary health care data, national surveys and state and territory administrative datasets to provide evidence to support policy development, service planning and delivery to improve the health and wellbeing of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. A range of ICG products and publications can be viewed on our website http://www.aihw.gov.au/indigenous-australians/.</p> <p>ICG is looking for an enthusiastic Indigenous student who is undertaking a course of studies in Indigenous studies, Social Science, Economics, Medical science etc. and would like to be involved in working with data and information on Indigenous Australians. An understanding of data, and good analytical and writing skills will be beneficial for working at the Institute.</p> <p>A specific area of interest to the Intern’s course of studies can be negotiated with the Group Head of ICG. As an Intern, under direction, you will have the opportunity to work in assessing data quality, undertaking literature reviews, data analyses, interpretation and preparation of reports for publication.</p> <p>In both groups supervision and mentoring support will be provided by a Unit Head and the Group Head.</p>
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
